The art of change \( \) As the design-driven Art Shoppe Lofts + Condos prepares for construction. Freed Condos prepares for construction, Freed Developments and Capital Developments have installed construction hoarding at the iconic Yonge Street site. In keeping with the project's commitment to the art of change,

the award-winning developers have partnered with The PATCH (Pubic Art Through Construction Hoarding) Project — a public arts agency that improves the urban experience by transforming urban spaces into ongoing curated exhibitions — to turn the site's construction hoarding into a six-panel art exhibition.

Freed and Capital are working with The PATCH Project to create a mixed-media exhibit featuring the work of local and internationally-renowned artist Chikonzero Chazunguza. Six of Chazunguza's works have been selected to complement "the art of change" vision that Freed and Capital have embodied for the Art Shoppe development.

The art installation, titled "In the City," is prominently displayed across approximately 3,300 square feet of construction hoarding.

### 'Watson's Dream' ) joins Toronto } commuters

A bold public sculpture by Torontobased artist Clare Scott-Taggart looks to be striding toward Wilson Station. Located on the southwest corner of Wilson Avenue and Tippet Road in North York, "Watson's Dream" emerges from the ground with kinetic force into the very busy commuter corridor.

The sculpture was commissioned by Brandy Lane Homes and project partners Wise Group and Shiplake Management Company for The Station Condos.

Standing 21-feet tall and composed of 21 spun stainless steel spheres, "Watson's Dream" is named after James Watson, the scientist who first described the structure of DNA. The sculpture is a stylized DNA strand representing the rapidly growing Downsview area.

"It is about how we, the community's DNA, come together to create a whole," Scott-Taggart said. "The single green sphere contrasted against the other black and white spheres represents the individual within the greater community."
